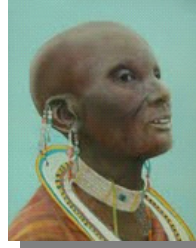


*A*s far back as I can remember, I had often thought that it would be fun to be able to draw and paint. I took a drawing class once, and also a class in water color. Both appealed to me, but

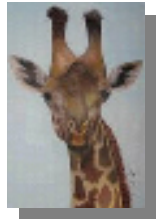
easy and fun, and I immediately signed up for his next class and several since. I belong to both the VAL and VAA, and enjoy the informal painting groups.
